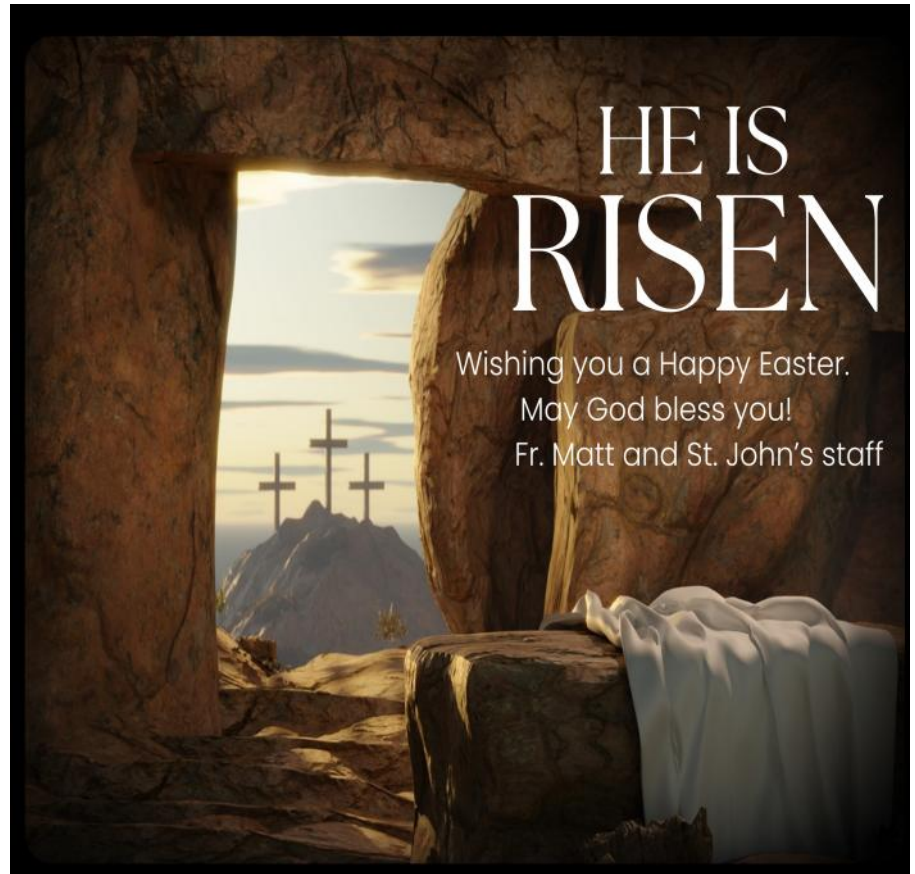

Alleluia! Jesus is risen! Alleluia! Jesus has conquered sin and death! Alleluia! Happy Easter! Alleluia!

We went through all Lent fasting from saying Alleluia, and now today we celebrate Easter Sunday once again we can say Alleluia. I think the goal/challenge for us today is to see how many times we can say Alleluia.

Today we celebrate the fact that tomb was empty and that Jesus has risen from the dead. This is what you would call a victory and not only is it a victory, but it is the ultimate championship kind of victory. Alleluia!

As I think of the victory, the ultimate championship of Christ risen from the dead two thoughts come to mind. Our God is powerful and our God always wins. Of all the liturgies that I celebrate, the Easter Vigil is one my favorites, it is a liturgy a lot of detail and things that I only do once year, a little extra planning and looking over is involved. From starting out with the lights out and hearing the Creation Story, to the Israelites crossing the Red Sea, and the discovery of the empty. It is a good reminder of God's power and that God has and continues to always wins. Second Christ risen from the dead is the ultimate championship victory, but it is also unique. In the world of sports winning the big championship is an end. The NCAA Basketball tournament has reached final four and on Monday night the Championship game is going to be played. Whoever wins the tournament after that team wins, that will be the end of that team. Some players will graduate, some might go professional, some might transfer to another school, and some will remain on the team. But the championship of Christ risen from the dead is a beginning, Christ's team grows. We experience this growth and beginning as Joseph Gossard and Hannah Lutman are baptized and Laura Stechschulte and Caylee are received into full communion into the Catholic Church. Welcome! For many of us who are baptized today is a fresh beginning. Alleluia!

A common tradition for many children today is that they will go hunting for eggs. What is the origin of this tradition with eggs and Easter? Traditionally, eggs were among the foods that people were supposed to fast from during Lent. Chickens still laid eggs during Lent so they were collected, decorated, and eaten at Easter as a sign of the end of the fast. Eggs are also a symbol of the resurrection of Jesus. The shell on the egg is the sealed tomb, and the cracking of the egg is Jesus's break through death to life. As children go hunting for eggs, may what they find in these eggs remind them that Jesus is risen from the dead. Alleluia!

Catechism Corner

The Fifth Commandment: "Thou Shall Not Kill"

We appropriately continue our commandment series with the fifth commandment, "Thou shall not kill." Jesus was killed for our transgressions. Jesus was killed because our sin kills others, ourselves and our relationship with Christ. Jesus knows what death does to our souls. Out of love, Jesus gives us the commandment to not kill. To follow this commandment, we must understand the depths of its meaning. (See the Catechism of the Catholic Church nos. 2258 – 2330 for more teaching on the 5th commandment)

"Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains forever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end. God alone is the Lord of life from its beginning until its end: no one can under any circumstance claim for himself the right directly to destroy an innocent human being." (CCC 2258) The covenant between God and mankind is interwoven with reminders of God's gift of human life and man's murderous violence:

"For your lifeblood I will surely require a reckoning...Whoever sheds the blood of man, by man shall his blood be shed; for God made man in his own image." Genesis 9: 5-6

The Catechism lists many life issues that violate the fifth commandment. Here are a few.

◆ **Intentional Homicide/Murder:** Except in cases of self-defense or in the defense of others, murder is forbidden (CCC no. 2268) ◆ **Abortion:** Human life must be respected and protected absolutely from the moment of conception. Modern technology makes clear that life begins at conception, the moment the egg is fertilized. The Church's condemnation of abortion can be traced back to the Apostles (CCC 2270-75) **Stem-cell Research and Cloning and In vitro fertilization** These practices are against God's law because retrieved embryos and fertilized eggs are discarded or destroyed in the process. *"Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you." (Jeremiah 1:5)* ◆ **Euthanasia:** Whatever its motives and means, direct euthanasia consists in putting an end to the lives of handicapped, sick, or dying persons. An act which causes death in order to eliminate suffering constitutes a murder gravely contrary to the dignity of the human person and to the respect due to the living God, his Creator. (CCC no. 2277) ◆ **Suicide:** contradicts the natural inclination of the human being to preserve and perpetuate his life. Grave psychological disturbances, anguish, or grave fear of hardship, suffering, or torture can diminish the responsibility of the one committing suicide. We should not despair of the eternal salvation of persons who have taken their own lives. By ways known to Him alone, God can provide the opportunity for salutary repentance. The Church prays for persons who have taken their own lives. (CCC nos. 2281 – 2283) ◆ **Scandal:** someone tempts or leads another to do evil. He damages virtue and integrity; he may even draw his brother into spiritual death. Scandal is a grave offense if by deed or omission another is led into a grave offense. (CCC no. 2284)

LIVING THE 5TH COMMANDMENT JUSTLY: The Catechism tells us we must have respect for the body's health. Respect for one's own body is a requirement of charity since the body is the temple of the Holy Spirit (1 Cor 6:19; 3, and 2 Cor 6:16), and we are responsible, insofar as it depends on us, to maintain our health as a means of serving God and others. The virtue of temperance disposes us to avoid every kind of excess: the abuse of food, alcohol, tobacco, or medicine. Those incur grave guilt who, by drunkenness or a love of speed, endanger their own and others' safety on the road, at sea, or in the air. We are also to show respect for our spiritual health and that of others. We should foster love and charity towards our neighbors and even our enemies out of respect for the life God has given in them. We show respect for life because we are God's children, and each of us is made in God's image and likeness. It is essential to develop a reverence for life from its beginning until its natural end. We must affirm life as sacred at every stage and every age. Life is precious. Life is a gift from God, thus we are called to support it, uphold it, and protect it. As we look this Holy Week to Jesus who gave His, let us embrace the life He gave us in exchange – a life filled with the Spirit.

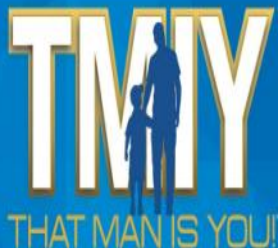

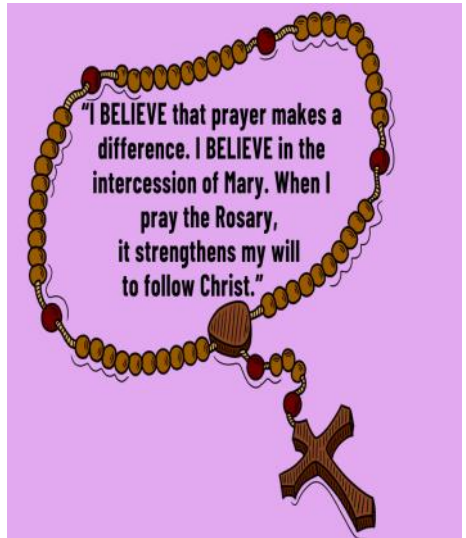

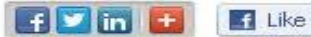

Diocese of Toledo Announces Three New Initiatives to Restore and Enhance Our Lady, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary Cathedral

Following upon the success of the diocesan-wide *Living Christ* capital campaign and the extraordinary generosity of so many donors, the Diocese of Toledo is excited to announce three new initiatives to restore and enhance the mother church of the Catholic diocese, Our Lady, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary Cathedral, located on Collingwood Blvd in Toledo. Work is now able to begin on three major projects that, while complementary, are unique in themselves, each planned to come to fruition in the near future.

The first project is the addition of the Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary, to be depicted on the five vaults of the ceiling of the Cathedral Narthex (vestibule). The addition of the five Luminous Mysteries, given to the Church by Pope John Paul II in 2002, completes the depiction of all 20 of the Mysteries of the Rosary at Rosary Cathedral, including the already existing Joyful, Sorrowful, and Glorious Mysteries.

The second project concentrates on the interior of the Cathedral, restoring its theological, artistic and architectural integrity. This will include the rearrangement of several integral elements including restoring the baptismal font to its original location in the baptistry; restoring the current free-standing altar to its original location under the baldacchino; restoring the tabernacle to its original location under the baldacchino; introducing a new free-standing altar in front of the baldacchino; refurbishing and restoring the original Cathedra to its original position; and, enhancing the lighting throughout the Cathedral.

According to Reverend Nathan Bockrath, the Cathedral's rector, "There are multiple motivations for these changes with the overall goal of maintaining and enhancing our Cathedral as a worthy space to celebrate the Sacraments, to lift minds and hearts in prayer and to offer fitting worship to our Lord."

The third project is to install air conditioning throughout the Cathedral which has long been a hoped-for addition. It is important to maintain a controlled temperature and environment to preserve the art and the recently restored historic Skinner organ, and to provide for the comfort of worshippers.

Thanks to the great generosity of the faithful, all of these projects together will ensure that the Cathedral continue to serve our local church far into the future, continue to be a beacon of beauty and light for the community, and continue to inspire faith, hope and charity.

PLENARY INDULGENCES



What is A Plenary Indulgence?

A plenary indulgence is a grace granted by the Catholic Church through the merits of Jesus Christ to remove the temporal punishment due to sin. The indulgence applies to sins already forgiven. A plenary indulgence cleanses the soul as if the person had just been baptized.

Plenary indulgences obtained during the Special Jubilee Year of St. Francis can also be applied to souls in purgatory with the possibility of obtaining two plenary indulgences for the deceased in one day, according to the Apostolic Penitentiary.

How to gain a plenary indulgence

This indulgence can be obtained, given the completion of the ordinary conditions (see below), through pilgrimages (including the holy sites designated for the Diocese of Toledo) or works of mercy and penance.

Make a pious pilgrimage to one of the designated pilgrimage sites. A pious visit includes:

- Spending a “suitable” amount of time during a prayerful visit in Eucharistic adoration, either in exposition or before the tabernacle, meditation, and concluding with praying for the intentions of Pope Leo XIV, the recitation of the Our Father, any legitimate form of the Creed, and invocations to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Ordinary conditions for plenary indulgence

To obtain any of the plenary indulgences the following conditions must be fulfilled:

- Detachment from all sin, even venial.
- Sacramental confession, holy Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the pope. These three conditions can be fulfilled a few days before or after performing the works to gain the indulgence, but it is appropriate that Communion and the prayer take place on the same day that the work is completed.
- A single sacramental confession is sufficient for several plenary indulgences, but frequent sacramental confession is encouraged to obtain the grace of deeper conversion and purity of heart.
- For each plenary indulgence that is sought, however, a separate Holy Communion and a separate prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father are required.
- The prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father is left up to the choice of the individual, but an Our Father and Hail Mary are suggested.

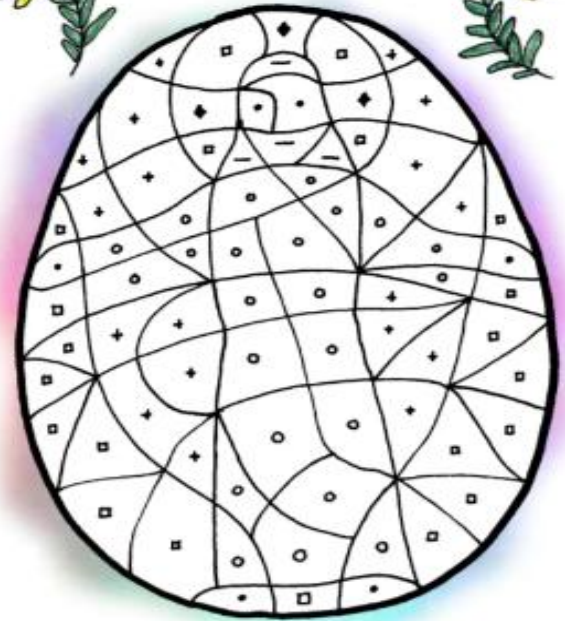
