### FROM THE DESK OF FATHER MATT

Today is the Third Sunday of Advent and the Third Sunday of Advent is also called Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is a Latin word meaning rejoice. On this Sunday we are called to rejoice, so how do we rejoice on this Sunday? We symbolically rejoice today by lighting the third candle on our Advent Wreathe and note that this third candle on the Advent Wreathe is a different color from the other three candles. On this Third Sunday of Advent, priests and deacons get the privilege of vesting in vestments the same color of the third candle on the Advent Wreathe. Now a question can be asked or debated about what color the third candle on the Advent Wreathe is or about the color of vestments I am vested in today. Some say the color is pink and others would counter argue saying it is rose. Now what is the difference between pink and rose I am not sure. The church officially says the color is rose. I am reminded of a comic that I saw once. The comic showed a priest saying Mass with two altar servers standing behind him. One server said to the other server "I believe he rose from the dead and not pinked from the dead."

It is pink, no it is rose, I am not exactly sure what color it is. It may be easy to get into an argument about what color it is, but if all we do is debate about what color it is we miss the point. A change in color today from usual violet in Advent to rose is intentional by the church today. The change in color in meant to be a halfway marker in the season, Jesus is soon to come, we are to rejoice. We are to rejoice that Jesus is soon to come. So, what does it mean for us to rejoice today? How are we to rejoice today? Normally when we think of the word we rejoice, we understand it to mean that we are supposed to be happy. We normally think of the words "rejoice and happy" as being interchangeable words. But they are not, you cannot switch the word rejoice with happy in a sentence and have the sentence make sense or vice versa. The word happy is an emotion and we do not have control over our emotions; we cannot change how we feel at any given moment. The word rejoice on the other hand is an action, rejoicing is something that we can choose to do at any given moment. We can choose to rejoice to express glory or triumph, no matter what we're feeling at any given moment. We can rejoice at all times and in all circumstances, not because we feel giddy but because life itself is a celebration.

We rejoice today because we are soon to celebrate the birth of Jesus, we rejoice because Christ is soon to come. We rejoice at the message that Jesus sends to John the Baptist the blind regains their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good new proclaimed to them. The coming of Christ is that abundant harvest that we anticipate.

This weekend there is a special collection for retired Religious Sisters, Brothers, and Priests. For years religious have ministered in the church, educating and reaching out to those in need in many ways. They have shared Christ's message of hope and joy. Through your generosity you can share Christ's message of hope and joy back to them to help meet their needs.

It is with this hope that we rejoice, it is with this hope that we Gaudete.



#### **SNOW EMERGENCY LEVELS**

Diocese of Toledo Snow Emergency Policy: "Whenever a county/city within the Diocese of Toledo is placed under a Level 3 Snow Emergency, during which all roadways are closed to non-emergency personnel, the Catholic Churches within that geographic region will cancel the scheduled Saturday Vigil, Sunday, or Holy Day Masses. Roman Catholics in that region, therefore, are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass. If Masses are cancelled, Catholics are encouraged to participate in Holy Mass via television, radio, or internet, making a spiritual Communion.

If **Putnam County** is ever under a Level 3 Snow Emergency the regular Mass times will be canceled here at St. John's. There will be a Mass at Noon, if you can get here safely you are welcome. If not, we encourage you to watch it on cable channel 3 or on our YouTube page. Level 1 and Level 2 if you can get here safely you are welcome.

### Catechism Corner

#### **ADVENT JOY**

On this third Sunday of Advent, we light another candle, this time pink as a symbol of Advent joy. As believers, we read and reflect on scriptures from the Old and New Testaments about the joy of our salvation in Jesus Christ. But what exactly is biblical joy? Let's look more closely at the meaning behind our Advent joy.

As Christmas draws ever nearer, we joyfully look forward to our celebration of Jesus' birth. We look back at the blessed event and rejoice in a promise fulfilled, a Savior born. But in the years and centuries before Christ's birth, God's people waited in joyful expectation, for a Savior promised, but One who had not yet come. Their joy was not based on the knowledge of what God had already done through his Son Jesus Christ, but their joy was an outpouring of their faith in what God WOULD do. Throughout the Old Testament, God calls his people to joyfulness. In Deuteronomy 26:11 God says, "You shall rejoice in all the good things the Lord your God has given to you and your household" (Deuteronomy 26:11). This verse is a command from God to rejoice, but it also a recognition of the cause and effect relationship between orientation toward God, and joy. When we take time to reflect on what God has done for us and offer him our very best—in time, effort, skills, gifts—the inevitable response of our souls is joy.

Joy is not just a happy emotion that we either feel or don't feel, it is a state of being that finds its source in God. The Bible is clear that joy comes from God (Neh. 8:9-10), and our joy is a product of what God has done and continues to do. It is gladness and contentedness flowing out of the well-spring of God's faithfulness and mercy, quite independent of our circumstances.

Today, our joy is anchored in the knowledge that God fulfilled his promise. And with Advent more than half over, our joyful anticipation of Christmas is coming to a head. It's easy to be giddy and full of rejoicing when we replay the angels words, "I bring you good news that will bring great joy to all people. The Savior—yes, the Messiah, the Lord—has been born today in Bethlehem, the city of David!" (Luke 1:11). But, it is important to remember that the joy we have in Christ is not seasonal or situational. Our joy is a response to what God has already done and continues to do. Paul encouraged the Colossians saying, "May you be filled with joy, always thanking the Father. He has enabled you to share in the inheritance that belongs to his people, who live in the light" (Colossians 1:12). It is a kind of joy, grounded in thankfulness for the first Advent of Jesus Christ and looking forward toward his second coming, that is a marker of faithful believers. Today, our joy, fueled by the Holy Spirit, is what God uses to spread his joy throughout the world. Mother Teresa once said "Joy is a net of love by which you can catch souls. A joyful heart is the inevitable result of a heart burning with love." True biblical joy is what God calls us to, and it is a joy that endures whether we're in the throes of cheerful Christmas anticipation or the lows of post-holiday blues. Joy is the fruit of Charity. As we prepare during Advent, let us reflect on this excerpt by our Holy Father Pope Benedict XVI about the true joy of Christmas:

"Joy is the true gift of Christmas, not the expensive gifts that call for time and money. We can communicate this joy simply: with a smile, a kind gesture, a little help, forgiveness. And the joy we give will certainly come back to us. Let us pray that this presence of the liberating joy of God shines forth in our lives."

### **DISMISSAL FOR CATECHUMENS (OCIA)**

#### Dismissal for Catechumens Journeying Into the Faith (OCIA)

The men and women who have received the Rite of Acceptance this past weekend, publicly declared that they would like to continue on the path to enter into full union with the Church. With the passage of this Rite, a "Dismissal" now takes place for the catechumens who are journeying into the Church. The journey is as individualized as each person. Two individuals have been baptized and are already a part of the community of Christians. They are now called "candidates"; while two individuals have not yet been baptized and they are now called "catechumens". The text for the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA) explains that the candidates and the catechumens have different roles to play in the order of the baptized and not-yet baptized.

Romans 12:4-8 says, "For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function"

The <u>role of the "candidates</u>", the baptized, also including all those who are already fully initiated into the Catholic Church, <u>is to participate in the Eucharistic prayers of the sacrifice</u>. For this reason, they remain with the body of Christ throughout the entirety of the Mass.

The <u>role of the "catechumens"</u>, the not-yet baptized, <u>is to be fed by the word of God</u> so they can respond to God's word in their life, and their <u>role within the body of Christ is that of "apprentice"</u> to learn how to be a disciple of Jesus. Because they have not yet received the grace of baptism, they are dismissed from the assembly to understand that grace and prepare their hearts to learn how to respond to it.

#### The dismissal reinforces and honors the dignity of baptism.

The dismissal is also important because it has a critical role in preparing catechumens, over time, for their eventual role and responsibilities in the order of the faithful. The OCIA text (#75.3 and 82.4) states, "at Mass they may also take part with the faithful in the liturgy of the Word, thus better preparing themselves for their eventual participation in the liturgy of the Eucharist. Ordinarily, however, when they are present in the assembly of the faithful, they should be kindly dismissed before the liturgy of the Eucharist begins...for they await their baptism...to participate in Christ's new worship." OCIA #67, "The group of catechumens goes out but does not disperse. With the help of some of the faithful, the catechumens remain together to share their joy and spiritual experience."

#### The dismissal does three important things:

- 1) It teaches the catechumens that they are in a conversion process, preparing them for the day when they are "led by the Holy Spirit into the promised fullness of time begun in Christ." (OCIA 206)
- 2) It alerts the members of the parish that we have catechumens among us, and that the community must "give help to those who are searching for Christ". (OCIA 9)
- 3) And it teaches the baptized candidates, who are not dismissed, that they have a special privileged place in the body as members of the baptized priesthood.

One may ask, "How can they learn if they are sent away?" First, catechumens are not yet ritually ready to enter into the priestly, sacrificial part of Mass. Secondly, they are spiritually still learning how to make their lives a "living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God" (Romans 12:1) Lastly, consider what happens with the baptized at the end of mass... they are sent away (or sent out), not because the mass is over and there is nothing left to do. On the contrary, they are sent out in order to "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord." In the same way, the catechumens, whom are still in training, must learn how to go out and first receive the Word and undergo a conversion process before they can fully join in the sacrificial life of discipleship. Their dismissal is a training in going out to reflect more deeply to then be able to be commissioned to proclaim the Word so as to be the presence of Christ in the world.

For catechumens, the liturgy of the Word is their 'job'. The text for OCIA does not see the dismissal as something optional, but rather, once becoming a member of the order of catechumens through the Rite of Acceptance, it is expected that catechumens will be dismissed each time that they are at Mass as an essential part of their preparation for entry into the order of the faithful.

#### O COME, O COME EMMANUEL

'O Come, O Come Emmanuel' have you ever wondered about the inspiration behind this beloved Advent hymn?

Wonder no more, the answer is the Great Antiphons, also called the O Antiphon's. Beginning on December 17 and ending on the evening of December 23, the church uses seven special antiphons for its office. The Roman Church has been singing the "O" Antiphons since at least the eighth century. They are the antiphons that accompany the Magnificat canticle of Evening Prayer. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present ones as well.

Below are the **O Antiphons**:

**December 17:** O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!

**December 18:** O Leader of the House of Israel, giver of the Law to Moses on Sinai: come to rescue us with your mighty power!

**December 19:** O Root of Jesse's stem, sign of God's love for all his people: come to save us without delay!

**December 20:** O Key of David, opening the gates of God's eternal Kingdom: come and free the prisoners of darkness!

**December 21:** O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death.

**December 23:** O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law: come to save us, Lord our God!
