SNOW EMERGENCY LEVELS

Diocese of Toledo Snow Emergency Policy: "Whenever a county/city within the Diocese of Toledo is placed under a Level 3 Snow Emergency, during which all roadways are closed to non-emergency personnel, the Catholic Churches within that geographic region will cancel the scheduled Saturday Vigil, Sunday, or Holy Day Masses. Roman Catholics in that region, therefore, are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass. If Masses are cancelled, Catholics are encouraged to participate in Holy Mass via television, radio, or internet, making a spiritual Communion.

If **Putnam County** is ever under a Level 3 Snow Emergency the regular Mass times will be canceled here at St. John's. There will be a Mass at Noon, if you can get here safely you are welcome. If not, we encourage you to watch it on cable channel 3 or on our YouTube page. Level 1 and Level 2 if you can get here safely you are welcome.

God is calling are you going to respond and answer the call? Or perhaps you hear the call and think the call is not for you, so you ignore the call. Or perhaps you hear God calling you and you think you are not worthy enough to be called by God, you think you are not worthy enough to answer God's call, so you do not answer. Whatever the reason you might give for not answering God's call, I invite you to trust that whatever the reason you think you are not worthy of God's call for you, God will make you worthy enough for the call that God has for you. God will qualify your call.

If you are having trouble believing that God will qualify the call that God has for you, I invite you to consider our scriptures today. In our scriptures we have three examples of God calling those that would seem to not qualify, and God qualifies the call. In our scriptures today Isiah sees something very holy, he sees Seraphim, and when he sees this, he says "'Woe is me, I am doomed! For I am a man of unclean lops, living among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!"' (Isiah 6:5). A Seraphim uses a pair of tongs to pick up an ember and touches his mouth with it. This removes his wickedness and purges him of his sin, that gives him the courage to answer the call to be sent by the Lord.

Similarly, God choose Paul to be an apostle, but as he points out he says he is not fit. We know the story of Paul and he persecuted the church; he had orders to bring back the first Christians in chains to Jerusalem. Paul says that it is by God's grace in him, it by God's gift that makes him worthy, to be an apostle. It is by God's grace that he can give witness to Christ.

Thirdly, we hear Jesus call his first disciples to follow him, the first disciples that Jesus calls are fisherman. In the grand scheme of things, if you think about fisherman, I do not think they would be your first choice to be disciples, but this is who Jesus choses. Jesus gets into Simon's boat while he is washing nets, Jesus teaches and then Jesus tells Simon to lower the nets for a catch and he catches a lot of fish. It is after this catch that Simon, James, and John leave their nets to follow Jesus.

There you have it three examples of God qualifying the one called and if God can qualify them God can qualify you when he calls you. God calls you not because you qualify because if you qualified you run into the temptation of not needing God. But it is when we do not qualify, we know that we cannot do it on our own and we need God's help to qualify our call. We God's help to do what it is that we have been called to do.

CATECHISM CORNER

Who was St. Blaise and why do we have the blessing of throats?



St. Blaise was the Bishop in Armenia who suffered martyrdom under Licinius about the year 316.

During the persecution of Licinius, St. Blaise, receiving some divine command, moved from the town and lived as a hermit in a cave. Wild animals visited, and he healed any that were sick and wounded. One day, a group of hunters gathering wild beasts for the game in

the amphitheater discovered St. Blaise and seized him. As he was being taken to the governor, St. Blaise encountered a woman whose pig was being seized by a wolf. St. Blaise commanded the wolf to release the pig, and it was freed unhurt.

While in prison, he miraculously cured a small boy who was choking to death on a fishbone lodged in his throat. Also, the woman whose pig had been saved brought St. Blaise candles so that his cell would have light and he could read the Sacred Scriptures.

Eventually, St. Blaise was condemned for upholding his Christian faith rather than apostatizing. He was tortured with the iron comb and finally beheaded.

By the sixth century, St. Blaise's intercession was invoked for diseases of the throat. He became one of the most popular saints in the spiritual life of the Middle Ages. Many altars were dedicated to his honor. He is also venerated as one of the "Fourteen Holy Helpers".

One reason for St. Blaise's popularity arose from the fact he was a physician who cured, even performing miraculous cures. Thereby, those who were sick, especially with throat ailments, invoked his intercession. Eventually the custom of the blessing of throats arose, whereby the priest held two crossed candles over the heads of the faithful or touched their throats with them while he invoked the prayer of the saint and imparted God's blessing: "Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

While we invoke St. Blaise for his protection against any physical ailment of the throat, we should also ask his protection against any spiritual ailment as well.

Anointing of the Sick

Joined to Christ, Witnesses of Hope and Healing

Anointing of the Sick is the sacrament that is received by those who are ill or suffering. By the sacred anointing and the prayer of the priest, the whole Church commends those who are sick to Christ. The sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gifts of strength, faith, peace, and courage, and his or her suffering is united with the suffering of Christ for the building up of the Church (Catechism of the Catholic Church [CCC], nos. 1520-23).

Through the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, the Church carries out Jesus' mission of compassion and healing for the sick. The one who is ill can also be a minister to others. By uniting their suffering to Christ, those who are sick can be signs of faith and witnesses of Christ's Resurrection to the entire community (St. John Paul II, Christifideles Laici [The Vocation and the Mission of the Lay Faithful in the Church and in the World], no. 54).

A Communal Celebration

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is both "a liturgical and a communal celebration." In the family home, hospital, or church, members of the Body of Christ gather for the sacramental rite led by a priest. The Penitential Rite followed by the Liturgy of the Word and sacramental anointing of the sick can inspire and comfort both those who are ill and their family and friends who are gathered (CCC, nos. 1517-18). Many parishes have communal celebrations at which many persons receive the sacrament. These sacramental celebrations are a "source of strength amid pain and weakness, hope amid despair" and a "joyful encounter" for the entire community (Christifideles Laici, no. 54).

Connection to the Communion of Saints

Anointing with sacred oil is a sign of blessing by the Holy Spirit of the one who is sick. Oil of the Sick, which receives a different blessing from the Chrism oil used during Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders, recalls the community's sharing of the Holy Spirit and the sick person's connection to the entire Body of Christ and Communion of Saints.

Imitation of Christ's Compassion

In the Gospels, Christ's great compassion toward the sick is expressed in the miraculous healings he performs, which heal the entire person, both body and soul. Parables such as the Good Samaritan (Lk 10:29-37) and the Judgment of the Nations (Mt 25:31-46) urge Christ's followers to share his ministry of compassion and healing and to imitate his "preferential love for the sick" and all who suffer (CCC, nos. 1503, 1506; Pope Benedict XVI, *Sacramentum Caritatis* [*Sacrament of Charity*], no. 22; see also Pope Francis, *Fratelli Tutti*, chapter 2).

Solidarity with All Who Suffer

We care for the sick because we see them as children of God and part of our human family. When one part of the Body of Christ suffers, we all suffer (1 Cor 12:26). The suffering of one impacts everyone. Thus, we are called to solidarity, which is responsibility on the part of everyone with regard to everyone (St. John Paul II, *Sollicitudo Rei Socialis* [On Social Concern], no. 38; Pope Benedict XVI, Caritas in Veritate [Charity in Truth], no. 38).

By our compassion, we remind those who are sick that "[the Church] shares your suffering. She takes it to the Lord, who in turn associates you with his redeeming Passion" (Synod of Bishops, *Per Concilii Semitas ad Populum Dei Nuntius*, no. 12). We are called to comfort, pray for and with, and be in solidarity with all who are sick or suffering.

Caring for those who suffer is not a burden, but a gift. Those who care for the sick do holy and important work; they walk with Christ's suffering people and in doing so, serve Christ himself (Mt 25:31-46). Those who minister to the sick and who work to secure decent health care for all become "the

living sign of Jesus Christ and his Church in showing love towards the sick and suffering" (*Christifideles Laici*, no. 53).

Union with Christ's Passion

While it is possible that the sacrament could bring physical healing, Anointing of the Sick is primarily about the healing of hope and of the spirit. Above all, the sacrament allows the person who is ill to unite more closely to Christ's Passion. This gives suffering a new meaning: a participation in the saving work of Jesus. This is a powerful witness that is for the good of the whole Church [CCC, nos. 1521-22].

Beacons of Hope

St. John Paul II wrote, "Even the sick are sent forth as laborers into the Lord's vineyard" (Christifideles Laici, no. 53). As the sick unite their sufferings to those of Christ, they become bearers of the joy of the Holy Spirit in the midst of affliction and witnesses of Christ's Resurrection. Anointing of the Sick testifies to the fact that all are called to participate in the redemption of the world (Sacramentum Caritatis, no. 22). We all have a role in sanctifying and building up the Church, whatever our physical condition. As the Synod of Bishops told an audience of sick and suffering persons, "We need you to teach the whole world what love is" (Per Concilii Semitas ad Populum Dei Nuntius, no. 12).

A Witness to Dignity

The sacrament reminds us that each person is made in the image of God and has dignity that remains unchanged, whatever the body suffers. The ministry of those who are sick is a powerful witness to the fact that human dignity is intrinsic and does not increase or decrease based on a person's physical state or abilities. This is why the Church works to protect the life and dignity of the person at every stage of life-the embryo, the person suffering from illness, the family in poverty, and the person nearing death—and why she works to secure access to decent health care for all.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

For those who are ill: St. Paul VI, at the closing of the Second Vatican Council said:

All of you who feel heavily the weight of the cross ... you the unknown victims of suffering, take courage. You are the preferred children of the kingdom of God, the kingdom of hope, happiness and life. You are the brothers of the suffering Christ, and with Him, if you wish, you are saving the world. (Address to the poor, the sick, and the suffering)

What role do you play in ministering to the People of God?

For those who are healthy: Reflecting on the Parable of the Good Samaritan, Pope Francis asks, "Will we bend down to touch and heal the wounds of others? Will we bend down and help another to get up?" (Fratelli Tutti [On Fraternity and Social Friendship], no. 70). We are invited to care for the needs of those who are sick with the same "fraternal spirit of care and closeness that marked the Good Samaritan" (no. 79).

How are you called to imitate the example of the Good Samaritan?



Greetings Everyone!

Thank you all for the Christmas cards, gifts, and prayers. It is hard to believe, but I just celebrated my last Christmas Eve and Christmas morning in Glandorf, at least for several decades and quite possibly ever. For soon, I will be at my parish assignments for future Christmas Masses. Knowing this, I tried to soak in as much of the moment as possible, from being the deacon for Mass on Christmas Eve to listening to the marvelous choir to even inviting the seminarians to come and experience the beauty of the church - especially during the Christmas season. For I always tell people, and I might be slightly biased, but there is no place prettier at Christmas time (this side of heaven) than St. John the Baptist Parish in Glandorf.

With the start of my last semester at the seminary, my class load is the lightest it has ever been, with only three classes: Johannine Literature (The Gospel according to John and Revelation), Penance and Anointing of the Sick, and Pastoral Leadership (a general business, management, leadership course). Even though it is a lighter class load, there is still plenty to learn, plan, and to keep practicing – like the Mass.

As we have for many years, the seminary went to Washington D.C., for the National March for Life. Since this event always happens near my birthday, it brings to mind how everyone deserves to have a birthday. A day to celebrate the gift that they are to the world and how precious and unique God made them. This year, the trip was a little different for us Toledo seminarians. Instead of traveling with the seminary, we rode the buses with other pilgrims from the Toledo Diocese, many of whom were from Putnam County. This was an excellent way for us to meet other pilgrims from the diocese and share our vocation stories, as we all marched for life.

Soon, the Annual Catholic Appeal will be kicking off for this year. Thank you in advance for supporting this yearly fundraiser for our diocese. Over my life, I have heard many people ask why should they donate to the ACA and what do we ever get back, for I was one of them years ago. Well, a quick answer is this: Me. One of the biggest portions of the yearly ACA goes towards promoting priestly and religious vocations, as well as the education of the future priests of the diocese. For the past several years, it seems that Glandorf, St. John's has always had an ACA goal of around \$35,000 - \$42,000 – brothers and sisters; this is roughly what it costs to educate, just one seminarian for just one school year. Thus, you have helped fund my seminary education, and in return, I will be giving back to all of you – the people of God, my life as a priest. Serving you and the wonderful people of our diocese, by celebrating Mass, bringing the sacraments to others, and being with so many people in the good times and rough times of life. THANK YOU! I honestly could not have done it without your prayers and support. It is fantastic to see how much of an impact we can have by helping to spread the Gospel of Christ by donating to the ACA each year.

Thank you again, and know that you remain in my prayers. May God always watch over and bless you, and may we all always remember to Run to Jesus!
