FROM THE DESK OF FATHER MATT

Many of our farmers of our parish are grain farmers and I would venture guess this parable of the Sower we hear about in our scriptures today in relatable experience to your daily livelihood. And I venture to guess if you hired the Sower that we read about in our scriptures today many of you would fire him or at least not be happy with him. I mean, this Sower was careless with seed, he was rather wasteful in letting seed to fall in not so good places where seed would not likely grow on the walking path that birds came and ate up, on rocky ground that got scorched by the sun and withered, and among thorns that choked it. And it is in this carelessness of the Sower that this Sower would cost you money. And it is in this carelessness and loss that many would not be happy with this Sower and many even echo that phrase "you are fired" to this Sower. In midst of frustration and being fired that this Sower speaks in defense. Pointing out that in each place that seed fell on the walking path, on rocky ground, and among thorns there was potential for growth and each place there is potential, even in the smallest remotest potential I took a chance. The issue was not in the careless scattering of the seed in each of the places that the seed was sowed there was potential for growth in each of the places. The carelessness was in the lack of caring for seed in places that the seed was sowed. No one was told to keep off the walking path, no one broke up the rocky soil, or pulled the weeds to make soil fertile for the seed to grow and produce fruit

Jesus throughout the gospel uses parables at a part of his teaching method, in our scriptures today the disciples ask him "'Why do you speak to them in parables?'" (Matthew 13:10). The simple answer why Jesus teaches using parables is that he has an important complicated message to share and the best way to understand the message by an image or a story or a parable. He uses something very simple to help understand something that is complicated. In the parable of the Sower, I like to think of God being the Sower and each one of us is field that the seed gets sowed in. And the seed is the gifts that our God gives us. While we may not be able to make the seed grow, each one of us in capable of providing the seed with fertile soil to help it grow. On flip-side of the coin each one of us can also provide soil that is unfertile and prevent the seed from growing. The question I think then is what kind of soil are you? I do not know about you but I like to picture myself as being of the type of soil that produces fruit

of "a hundred, sixty, and thirty-fold" (Matthew 13:8). But I must admit that sometimes we are not soil of this type, we can be those other types of soil that does not produce to my full potential or even produce at all. Even when we are not producing to our full potential, the next season our God gives us another chance to produce.

The real question for us today is not what type of soil are we? The real question for us is how are we cultivating the soil of our lives so that we can produce fruit that is "a hundred, sixty, and thirty-fold" (Matthew 13:8) for our God?

Dear Friends,

A couple of Sundays ago, I had the chance to make my first official "athome" Eucharistic pilgrimage. It was a torrentially rainy day in Chicago—as a matter of fact, if you had a basement, there was a high chance you experienced significant flooding. Despite the intense rain, however, I felt deeply drawn to take a drive out to Des Plaines, Illinois, to visit the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

As I approached the parking lot, I recognized that hundreds of people were there for one of the five Sunday Masses celebrated at the shrine. A little while later, I found myself at the outdoor grotto standing before the replica of St. Juan Diego's Tilma, which is enshrined in Mexico City and which bears the miraculous image of our Lady. I stood in the pouring rain (protected by my umbrella!) and meditated on the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary as I offered my intentions to Jesus through Mary. I noticed so many individuals, couples, and families coming and going-most without protection from the rain-to pray there. One man even knelt in the pouring rain before the Tilma replica with bowed head for ten minutes.

After that, I went to the large, recently erected chapel. As I knelt at the back of the chapel silently uniting myself to Jesus, hidden yet present in the Tabernacle, I experienced a deep confidence that my intentions were of great importance to him. I felt united to Jesus in a new way, and rested in the inner silence of my heart, grateful for this time of pilgrimage.

Now, my mind is drawn to the words of Will Peterson, director of the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, which we shared on June 15: "My favorite pilgrimage is the one I make each time I attend Mass." At every Mass, we journey, surrounded by the Blessed Trinity and all the angels and saints, through the Paschal Mystery, encountering Jesus fully alive in the Eucharist. If our hearts are rightly disposed, every Mass takes us one step closer to heaven.

In my own pilgrimage adventure this month, I was especially grateful to have Mary, the Mother of Jesus, as my special companion. Her words to St. Juan Diego still echo in my heart, "Am I not your Mother?" And, what a good Mother she is! May Mary always lead you and me to her beloved Son, Jesus!

I hope you'll join me and make your own "at-home" Eucharistic pilgrimage-if not this summer, then as soon as you are able. It is a simple, concrete way to experience the

reality that our whole life is truly a Eucharistic pilgrimage toward our heavenly home, if only we desire it and remain open to the grace to live it well. Don't worry, we are never

alone: Jesus is with us every step of the way!

Eucharistic Mini-Pilgrimage Guide

Go in peace! The journey you are making is under the eye of the LORD. JUDGES 18:6

1. CHOOSE A PILGRIMAGE DESTINATION AND TIME FRAME

WHERE: Choose a holy site that will help you grow closer to Jesus in the Eucharist. This could be a church, shrine, or monastery. See if your diocese has a list of local pilgrimage sites.

WHEN: Make sure the site will be open when you intend to arrive. Plan your journey around the celebration of the Mass or Eucharistic adoration.

TRAVEL: Decide how you will be traveling—walking, driving, by train, etc. Make arrangements beforehand so that you can be fully present to your pilgrimage experience.

WITH WHOM: Will you be traveling alone or with a community such as your family, parish, or youth group?

2. YOUR INTENTIONS FOR THE PILGRIMAGE

Pray for the special intentions that you and your loved ones have. You might also carry in your heart intentions for the Church, the world, or your local community. Be very specific and write them down. Jesus wants to bring healing, wholeness, and peace!

3. SPIRITUAL PREPARATION

PRAYER: Invite family and friends to join you in prayer.

PATRON: Pick a patron saint for your pilgrimage as your heavenly companion for the journey.

4. SETTING OUT/TRAVELING TO YOUR DESTINATION

PRAYER: Make your pilgrimage a time of prayer and thanksgiving. Consider vocal prayers like the Rosary, Divine Mercy Chaplet, or reading from Scripture: Mark 14:22-24, John 6:35, John 6:51-57, Acts 2:42, 1 Corinthians 10:16-17, 1 Corinthians 11:23-28.

5. ARRIVING AND PRAYING FOR YOUR INTENTIONS

As you come to the threshold of your pilgrimage destination, do so with the knowledge that Jesus is waiting to encounter you in the Eucharist.

PRAYER: Spend some time in silent adoration, thanking God for this pilgrimage and praying for your petitions. Pray individually and as a group.

LITURGY: If possible, participate in Mass, offering the Mass for your petitions.

6. RETURNING

SHARING: Spend some quality time before you leave or on the way home sharing the graces of your experience with one another. If you are traveling on your own, journal about these graces or share them with a friend.

7. POST-PILGRIMAGE

After your pilgrimage, pray about how the experience changed you. Ask Jesus to show you how he wants to be more present in your life through this pilgrimage.

If you carried the intentions of others, share something about what the pilgrimage meant for you with them.

Encounter with Jesus leads to mission. Make an act of service or kindness to share in the saving mission of Jesus.

A Eucharistic pilgrimage is a testimony to the world that Jesus is alive in the Eucharist, and he accompanies us—all of us—on our pilgrimage through life.

The Holy Father asks for our prayers for a specific intention each month.
