> FROM THE DESK OF DEACON DON

This is a great time of the year to watch plants starting to grow and turn green and one particular area that I like to watch is an area along St.Rt. 224 on this side of Findlay. Close to the intersection of St. Rt. 235, there is usually a couple of fields with wheat sowed in them and at any time you can see from 2 to 50 deer grazing on the wheat. I am sure that the farmer there isn't happy but this setting reminds me of the Gospel reading today. In it, Jesus says, "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat but if it dies, it produces much fruit." Jesus is giving them hints of His death and resurrection. This setting follows his triumphant entry in Jerusalem. Some Greeks are inquiring about Jesus as they may have been converts to Judaism or may have seen the enthusiastic crowds because of Jesus. Jesus neither agrees or disagrees with their meeting but instead is in a more solemn mood in what is to come for Him. Jesus makes the statement of "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified." He has talked about this hour before at the wedding feast of Cana and then at other times in His ministry when he says, "My hour has not yet come." There is no excitement in His voice and He knows the road that He must take. And Jesus invites us to follow Him on the same pathway. He talks about the grain of wheat and then He applies the image to himself and to us. "The man who loves his life loses it, while the man who hates his life in this world preserves it to life eternal." Jesus says that the spiritual side of us is more important than the physical side. As St. Paul says, "I am in this world but I am not of this world." Jesus is calling us to be His beacon of light in this world; to be a witness to His love and mercy but don't let the pleasures of this world consume you. Always operate with Jesus in your heart and you can't go wrong. As we come closer to His passion, death, and resurrection, let us prepare ourselves for the great events to

resurrection, let us prepare ourselves for the great events to come. We have followed Jesus from the desert to Mount tabor and we see the importance of what He is going to do. And our faith and hope in Him have grown over the weeks of Lent. So, as we wind down to the Easter Triduum, may we draw closer to His passion and death, and embrace His risen body on Easter Sunday.

Who is St. Patrick?



St. Patrick is one of the most well-known saints worldwide, with millions who share his name (Pádraig, Patricio, Patrício to name a few translations) and many churches named after him. Born in the late fourth century A.D. in Roman Britain (either Scotland or Wales, historians debate), legend holds this saint drove all snakes out of Ireland, though we know there have never been snakes in Ireland. This legend likely arose from the credit to St. Patrick's for spreading Christianity in Ireland; he is known as the great "Apostle of Ireland." St. Patrick was actually kidnapped when he was 16 by Irish raiders

in his homeland and taken to Ireland where he was enslaved for several years. According to tradition, he spent six years in the Slemish Mountain region in Northern Ireland as a shepherd of pigs and sheep. He eventually escaped and journeyed back to his homeland as a stowaway across the North Channel. Upon returning, he studied Christianity and became a deacon and, ultimately, a bishop. After a great vision, St. Patrick returned to Ireland to

So I am first of all a simple country person, a refugee, and unlearned. I do not know how to provide for the future. But this I know for certain, that before I was brought low, I was like a stone lying deep in the mud. Then he who is powerful came and in his mercy pulled me out, and lifted me up and placed me on the very top of the wall. That is why I must shout aloud in return to the Lord for such great good deeds of his, here and now and forever, which the human mind cannot measure. St. Patrick from Hallow

CATECHISM CORNER

The Work of Mercy we will look at this week is:

Work of Mercy: Shelter the Homeless from "The Works of Mercy Explained" by Silvia Vecchini

"Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers." Romans 12:13

The definition of "pilgrim" is a person on a journey toward a specific place, often a holy place. A pilgrim wants to go to a place of worship where a person can return to God and grow closer to him.

Over the centuries many Christians have gone on pilgrimages to the Holy Land – the places where Jesus lived and preached. Christians also go to places dear to Christian tradition and tied to the saints, martyrs, or the Blessed Mother. Because these journeys exposed pilgrims to danger, exhaustion, and many long days of walking, giving shelter to pilgrims was – and is – considered an important work of mercy by Christians.

The practice of hospitality, however is even more ancient than Christianity. Welcoming and respecting the "stranger" who is away from his homeland is visible throughout the Old Testament. The people of Israel – God's chosen people – had the painful experience of being foreigners, or "aliens", in Egypt, far from the land God had given them. In Egypt, they were exploited and oppressed. God remembers his people and asks them to remember their own experience: "You shall not wrong or oppress a resident alien, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt" (Exodus 22:21), and also: "The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself" (Leviticus 19:34).

Who are Today's Aliens?

Certainly many still go on pilgrimages with the intention of living their faith more profoundly. Let us consider the other "pilgrims" we see today. In many countries hundreds and hundreds of refugees arrive every day. Many are fleeing their homelands because of war, famine, and conditions of extreme poverty.

At great risk to themselves they crossed the terrain because their lives at home were being threatened. On the occasion of the World Day of Refugees, Pope Francis invited all of us to ask for forgiveness on behalf of anyone who closes the door on those who are searching for a family, or who need to be taken care of. He encouraged us to respect the dignity of our brothers and sisters who are far from home and to pray for all who are seeking refuge where they can live without fear.

Reflection: If we consider ourselves Christians, we must think about how to give hospitality to today's pilgrims and welcome those who have nothing or are escaping famine, war, and death.

Action Ideas: Don't complain about cold or heat- offer it up for those who lack shelter, Volunteer at a homeless shelter, Carry around \$5 gift cards for the homeless, Give money to the ministries who serve the poor, Help organize a fund-raiser for a family adopting a child, Consider taking on foster care as a family, Call someone who you now is lonely or could use a friend, Make a point to make conversation with someone who is not in your everyday circle, Smile and greet others you pass along the way.

WORK OF MERCY: Comfort the Sorrowful

THE GRACE I SEEK: to follow the Lord wherever he leads me

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

Pause for a few moments, and allow yourself to become aware of Jesus' gift of himself in the Eucharist. Realize that, at this very moment, the Lord of Life is gazing upon you with great love. Allow yourself to receive his loving gaze. You are his beloved child. Rest in his loving gaze.

Thank Jesus for the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

ASK FOR THE GRACE: Jesus, help me to follow you wherever you go.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.

"But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD. I will place my law within them, and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be my people." (Jeremiah 31:33)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

Today we hear the Lord promise us that he establishes a covenant with us. He promises to form our hearts and to be our God. In what areas of your life do you doubt his promise to be your God and to be present in your heart? Be specific and ask the Lord how he wants to be present in those places of your life.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Again, allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Let the Holy Spirit speak to you through this passage.

"Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be. The Father will honor whoever serves me." (John 12:26)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

Today we are given quite the challenge: if we serve Jesus, we MUST follow him wherever he leads! However, he also promises that the Father honors all who do this. Do you sense a place in your life where Jesus is trying to lead you, but you are afraid to follow because you don't have all the answers yet? Give this fear to the Lord, asking for his loving presence to comfort you and encourage you.

Remain in silence with the Lord. Allow him to speak in the silence, in your heart. Receive his presence. If it helps, write down what you sense the Lord communicating to you during this time of prayer.

CLOSING PRAYER — By your help, we beseech you, Lord our God, may we walk eagerly in that same charity with which, out of love for the world, your Son handed himself over to death. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen. (Collect, Fifth Sunday of Lent)

SUNDAY MASS CONNECTION — At every Mass, Jesus offers himself to the Father for us. We can always join our own offerings with Jesus at Mass. This Sunday, offer your desire to whole-heartedly follow Jesus wherever he leads you.

LOVE IN ACTION — In the busyness of daily life, it can often be a challenge to look beyond our own struggles and difficulties to follow the Lord's command to care for others, especially when they are suffering. Is there someone in your life who is really struggling right now, perhaps with disappointment or grief? Ask the Lord how he wants you to comfort them, trusting that this will be part of following him more closely.


