7 FROM THE DESK OF FATHER MATT

Because I am a Missionary of the Precious Blood, this weekend you get the joy of joining me in celebrating the Feast Day of our Founder St. Gaspar del Bufalo. In our church we are privileged to have a statue and his relic. Who is St. Gaspar and why is he important.


St. Gaspar was born on January 6, 1786, the Solemnity of the Epiphany so his parents named him after the magi Gaspar Melchior Balthasar. When Gaspar was three months old, he suffered from a smallpox that threatened to leave him blind. His mother took him to the Church of the Gesu and she prayed at the altar of St. Francis Xavier and Gaspar was cured immediately. In his early years Gaspar was concerned for the poor and those in the hospital, often sharing a portion of the food from his meals with them. He would also tutor children that would come in from the countryside to sell their goods, children that otherwise would not receive an education.

In 1808, Gaspar was ordained to the priesthood and shortly after being ordained Napoleon wanted Gaspar to sign an oath of allegiance to him. To which Gaspar said, "I cannot, I must not, I will not." Because he would not sign Gaspar was sent into exile and prison and his time in exile was tough during this time his health suffers, his mother dies, and the conditions were not good rats used to craw among the cells. It is during this time that Gaspar begins to develop a devotion to the Precious Blood of Jesus.

After Napoleon was overthrown, Gaspar returned to Rome and wanted to be a missionary and go to India just like St. Francis Xavier. The Bishop of Rome, the pope calls Gaspar in and tells him that it is a noble task to want to go to India, but a task that is not meant for him. Gaspar had the gift to preach and that was needed in Rome in the aftermath of Napoleon. During the reign of Napolean, the church had become a mess there were priest that signed the oath of allegiance and some that had not. Church attendance had dropped, and some churches were turned into barns. Gaspar obediently stayed and preached in Rome and in his missionary work brought people back to church. The gift of his preaching is still known.

Today in World Mission Sunday, the church by its nature is missionary, and the church thrives when it is being missionary. We often picture a missionary as going to some far-off place and there is a second collection today to support these missionary efforts. But this is not the only way to be a missionary, St. Gaspar was a missionary but did not leave far from home, we can also be Missionary by not going far too. St. Gaspar was a missionary by his preaching the gospel,

he preached the message of gospel to those needed to hear message that because of Jesus blood shed on the cross, they are loved by God. Gaspar particularly reached out to those that would appear to be furthest from this love. Our scriptures today speak about bringing liberty to captives, recovery sight to the blind, and going outside the camp. In our call to be missionary, like Gaspar we called to reach to those who would appear to be the furthest from God's love and let experience and know that they are loved by God. Who is it that appears to be furthest from God's love, that you can reach out to that needs to hear this message?

Each week at Holy Mass we profess our belief in reciting the Nicene Creed. What does it mean when we say we believe in these statements/ truths? We will take a look at each statement/truth of the creed and examine it's meaning through the use of the Faith and Life Series by Ignatius Press that is utilized in our parish religious education morning program, 5th Grade curriculum. <u>"Begotten not made, consubstantial with the Father"</u> "And now I am no more in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, keep them in your name, which you have given me, that they may be one, even as we are one." (John 17:11)

Imagine for a moment that you were Jesus, beginning your ministry. No one has any idea that you are the Son of God, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, fully God and fully man. You know that Israelite people had been waiting for hundreds of years for the Kingdom of Israel to be restored. You know that that the people expected an earthly king, with earthly riches and an earthly kingdom to come galloping in on a white horse. Yet, they did not know that their new King would be God himself and that his mission would be to build the Kingdom of God. They did not know that the law of the Kingdom would be love. The people looked to Scripture to who the Messiah would be. Jesus did, in fact, fulfill the Scriptures.

-He would be a man. (Jesus is a man...but also divine). -He would be a descendant of David. (He is a descendant of David). — He would restore the Kingdom of Israel. (He brought the reign of God and opened the Kingdom of Heaven). — He would be a holy leader. (He is a holy leader and more. Jesus is priest, prophet and kin, as well as our God).

Little by little Jesus revealed He is the Messiah so that people would be able to understand and accept it. In fact, at times when Jesus did talk about His identity as the Son of God, he was accused by some of blasphemy (speaking about or to God in a scornful or irreverent way).

To confirm His teachings and show that He truly is God, Jesus performed miracles. By witnessing these things, people could see that Jesus shared in God's power. Through these miracles people came to believe.

One of the first to believe was Simon Peter. When Jesus asked Simon who he thought Jesus was, Simon responded, "You are the Christ [the Messiah], the Son of the living God." (Mt 16:16)] Jesus realized God must have revealed this to Simon as he could not have known using human understanding alone. In response, Jesus names Simon "Peter" and said that he was the rock upon which the Church would be built. Peter's understanding and faith showed his fitness to become the first Pope.

Jesus would also reveal His identity to Peter, John and James through the event known as the "Transfiguration". The four of them climbed a high mountain, and then Peter, John, and James witness a great spectacle! Jesus' face and clothes shone with a great light and a cloud fell over him. They heard a voice from heaven say, "This is my beloved Son." (Mt 17:5). They also noticed the prophets Moses and Elijah were present next to Jesus.

Can you imagine this?!

Jesus revealed He is the Son of God in various ways:

- By his miracles, Through showing his glory in the Transfiguration, By the testimony of God the Father at his baptism an at the Transfiguration Who do you say that Jesus is?

St. Gaspar del Bufalo, founder, Missionaries of the Precious Blood



St. Gaspar is often pictured holding a large crucifix.

Small in stature, St. Gaspar was a powerful preacher who knew the value of a dramatic pose. The crucifix held the people's attention while Gaspar's voice captured their imagination.

St. Gaspar was born in Rome on January 6, 1786. Because he was born on the Feast of the Epiphany, his parents named him for the three wise men, Gaspar Melchior Baltazar del Bufalo.

From an early age, he felt compelled to help the poor, sick and imprisoned. He knew he wanted to be a priest and a missionary, and was ordained at age 22.

Gaspar lived in turbulent times. Napoleon had invaded what is now Italy, and demanded an oath of allegiance, which Gaspar refused. He was sent into exile along with many priests and even the pope! When he returned to his home country, he founded his religious congregation, the Missionaries of the Precious Blood (C.P.P.S.) on August 15, 1815. Gaspar preached parish missions, founded mission houses and guided his Missionaries in their new way of life.

Gaspar never left Italy, but his Missionaries now serve in 20 countries. They proclaim our salvation in the Precious Blood of Christ for the spread of the Gospel and the renewal of the Church.

St. Gaspar, who died on December 28, 1837, was canonized in 1954. His feast day is October 21.

If incident is after hours, please call the Sheriff's Department at 419-523-3208. They will contact the caseworker on call and the caseworker will get back to the one reporting the incident--leave your contact number with the Sheriff Department person. The person who witnessed or was told is to be the person to make the call.

Report incident to the Diocese of Toledo after County Caseworker has been notified by calling the Diocese of Toledo Victim Assistance Coordinator at 419-244-6711, ext 4880. Notify Pastor, if not already notified. With Pastor's discretion, next call parents and give basic information, while not disclosing any personal information. If abuse is by a teacher, parish staff, or volunteer, report incident to Diocese of Toledo after County Caseworker has been notified.

Solidarity

In their statement on Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the Catholic bishops of the United States identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching and apply them to some concrete issues. This is not to tell the faithful for whom or against whom to vote, but instead to help them form their consciences in accordance with God's truth as they approach this often-challenging decision. The four main principles are the Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity. They are all interrelated. This bulletin focuses on Solidarity, and the other three principles are covered in three other bulletins in this series. ——★

Solidarity is "a firm and persevering determination to commit oneself to . . . the good of all and of each individual, because we are all really responsible for all."¹ We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. The person is social in nature; we develop and flourish within a community. As baptized members of the community of the Church, we are part of one body in Christ and we are also part of one global human family.²

In Fratelli Tutti (On Fraternity and Social Friendship) Pope Francis places solidarity at the center of what it means to cultivate social friendship as one family: Solidarity means much more than engaging in sporadic acts of generosity. It means thinking and acting in terms of community. It means that the lives of all are prior to the appropriation of goods by a few. It also means combatting the structural causes of poverty, inequality, the lack of work, land, and housing, the denial of social and labor rights.³

Thus, solidarity affects not only the goals we pursue in public life, but also the way we pursue them—ever mindful that we are all brothers and sisters, all children of God.

In imitation of the Good Samaritan, we seek to be neighbor to all.⁴ We are called to practice "radical solidarity" by accompanying pregnant women to choose life and by offering support to new mothers and their children.⁵ As neighbors to all, we also advocate for families affected by poverty, unemployment, or illness, individuals struggling with mental illness or addiction, the elderly and those with disabilities, and all whose livelihoods and homes are endangered by climate change.⁶

In countries rayaged by war, such as Ukraine, West Africa, and the Middle East, we must "touch the wounded flesh of the victims" and support efforts for relief and peace,⁷ while also working collaboratively to reduce and eliminate nuclear weapons.⁸

We seek policies that "welcome, protect, promote, and integrate" migrants and refugees who arrive at our borders, and which aid development in countries of origin.⁹

Racism is an obstacle to solidarity, and we strive to root it out not only by examining our hearts individually, but also by looking critically at our policies and institutions.¹⁰

In a culture that overemphasizes the accumulation of wealth, we must not forget our "obligation to ensure that every person lives with dignity and has sufficient opportunities for his or her integral development."¹¹ As we seek to foster solidarity in hearts and policies, let us pray with Pope Francis in Fratelli Tutti:

Lord, Father of our human family . . . Move us to create healthier societies and a more dignified world, a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war. Amen.¹²


