FROM THE DESK OF FATHER MATT



In our scriptures today we hear Bartimaeus cry out "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me." (Mark 10:47). Bartimaeus is aware of his blindness, and he wants Jesus to help him so that he can see. Like Bartimaeus if we are aware our blindness, we would want and ask Jesus to open our eyes so that we can see. But what happens to us if we have blindness that we are not aware of? What happens if we are told that we are blind and we do not believe the message? Can Jesus still help us?

Speaking of blindness, of not being able to see, and needing help. I am reminded of my blindnesses, I am particularly reminded of my literal blindness when I was told that I needed to start wearing glasses. When I first was told it, I did not believe it, I thought my eyes were fine, I did not need to wear glasses. I was in the seventh grade and one day at school someone came to test the students' vision. I remember looking into the machine they brought to test my vision and remember the letters being hard to read. But I thought it was not my eyes that was the problem, it was because the machine was not working right. A few days letter mom and dad got a letter in the mail saying I failed the vision test, and I needed to an eye doctor. I remembered a year or two prior to failing the vision test at school, a similar letter was sent home. I was taken to the eye doctor, nothing was wrong, I did not need glasses, and I remember being told this kind of thing happens all the time. Students fail vision the test at school, and they go to the eye doctor, and everything is fine. Mom made the appointment to see the eye doctor and I went to the appointment and at the end of the examination the eye doctor gave me pair of lenses to put up to eyes so I could read the letter on the wall and he said I needed glasses. Not truly believing the eye doctor, I picked out a pair of frames at Walmart and then about an hour later they were ready. I remember just before putting my glasses on the first time I was told to look out into the store, then they put my glasses on and being told to look out into the store again and I was told that my eyes lit up.

Jesus cures us of our blindness when we are crying out for help and yes, Jesus also helps when we are blind, and we do not think are or in need of help. In our scriptures today we

also hear that "Every high priest is taken from among men and made their representative before God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins" (Hebrews 5:1). The Letter to Hebrews was written to Jewish Levitical class of priests whose ministry was offer sacrifice to make up for sins, using the blood of animals to offer sacrifice. The point of the letter is the author is saying that Jesus is the great high priest, and that he offered his blood in sacrifice to make up for our sins. Jesus offered his blood to helps us for those moments when are crying out for help and for those moments when we think we can make it on our own. What can Jesus help you with today?

Each week at Holy Mass we profess our belief in reciting the Nicene Creed. What does it mean when we say we believe in these statements/truths? We will take a look at each statement/truth of the creed and examine it's meaning through the use of the Faith and Life Series by Ignatius Press that is utilized in our parish religious education morning program, 5th Grade curriculum. "For us men and for our salvation, He came down from Heaven"

"Who can forgive sins but God alone?" (Mark 2:7)

Jesus proved He was God by doing miracles. To go even deeper, he also forgave sins! The people knew the only one to be able to forgive sins was God alone. So, when Jesus began forgiving sins, along with His miracles, many more people began to believe He was, in fact, the Son of God.

Take for example, the paralytic healed by Jesus when he was forgiven of his sins. (Mark 2:1-12). The man didn't tell Jesus his sins, but as God, Jesus knew everything about him. He knew this man was sorry for his sins because he sought Jesus out for healing and forgiveness. He approached Jesus in faith. He knew Jesus had the power to heal him. This man was healed both physically and spiritually. Jesus first forgave his sins, showing that spiritual healing is the most important type of healing, and then he also healed him physically, telling him to stand and walk.

In this miracle, Jesus claimed the power to forgive sins, which belongs to God alone, but then he proved his power as God by also healing the man's paralysis. This miracle revealed that Jesus is God.

After Jesus died and rose from the dead himself, many more came to believe, yet many turned away in disbelief. But, this did not stop Jesus from completing His mission – that mission that is still being carried out today!

After Jesus' Resurrection, He appeared to the Apostles and gave *them* power to forgive sins (John 20:19-23). He was making the Apostles (and future bishops, priests) the instruments of God's work on earth.

Through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we are forgiven and receive absolution, which is God's forgiveness of our sins administered through His Church. Jesus' mission to forgive the sins of others continues through the priesthood. Jesus gives us the Sacrament of Reconciliation, so that we not only are forgiven, but so that we can receive the free gift of grace, which helps us not to sin again.

Jesus is calling us all to come to Him in faith to receive His blessings of forgiveness to heal our souls and restore it in unity with Him and His Church. This restoration brings peace and joy back to souls.



Sonday Funday – October 6, 2024 after 10:30 mass until 3:30. Parish Council and Finance Committee will be getting snacks and drinks for concession stand and volunteer for tending concession and other preparation duties.

Blanchard Ave Access – The Schroeders are hosting an event with local priests and deacons to show people what their ideas for the center would entail.

Use of Parish Center – Discussed how to best use the Parish Center to spread the Catholic faith based on our parish mission statement. Still looking at what is best for the parish and the center. Also need to evaluate concerns related to liability to the parish.

New Business

It was brought to the councils attention that there are still issues with poor audio in some spots in the church.

Window on the south side of church has an issue with a leak or possible delamination of fiberglass on the wall. Will take a better look at and move forward with getting it repaired.

Cemetery committee will be installing 2 *columbaria's* (vault for urns for cremation) next spring.

Candlesticks for servers – price to fix the gold plate was presented and was decided to go ahead with the repair.

Mike Karhoff presented a list of possible projects. Repairs and upgrades to the campus and buildings. The goal is to build a 5 year plan for spreading out the financial impact.





Called to Serve Moms in Need



Our Blessed Mother models a profound witness to love and life in the Gospel account of the Visitation. Luke's Gospel tells us that, when Mary learns that her cousin Elizabeth is pregnant, she travels to the hill country "in haste" (Lk 1:39). Despite being unexpectedly pregnant herself, Mary responds to this news with urgency.

She embarks on a long and perhaps difficult journey to be with her cousin during her time of need, bearing Christ to her as He lay quietly hidden in Mary's womb. And, although Jesus is veiled from view, when Mary first arrives John the Baptist leaps for joy in Elizabeth's womb, recognizing the presence of Christ (Lk 1:44). Mary, with Jesus, spends the next three months at Elizabeth's side.

The witness of our Blessed Mother invites us to become more aware of the needs of pregnant and parenting moms in our own parishes and communities. A woman with an unexpected pregnancy may have any number of fears and challenges: facing judgment from her friends and family, losing her job or housing, or being abandoned by the father of her child.

Following Mary's example, we can ask ourselves how to better know these mothers, listen to them, seek understanding, and help them obtain the necessities of life for themselves and their children. How can we, like the Blessed Mother, lovingly support mothers in welcoming and caring for God's gift of life?

Throughout the whole of Scripture, Mary's words are few. Yet, in her sacred encounter with Elizabeth, a powerful declaration pours from her lips. Mary proclaims to all generations that the Lord lifts up the lowly, fills the hungry with good things, and remembers his promise of mercy from age to age (Lk 1:46-56). In both word and deed, Mary speaks a

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my savior.

Luke 1:46-47

message of *hope*—not only to Elizabeth, but also to every mother in need and to each of us.

Mary's witness is an invitation to step out in love and compassion. It is a summons to *make haste* to help vulnerable women who may be isolated and alone. By doing so, we too can bear Christ within us and help others experience His presence.

Inspired by the Blessed Mother's example and guided by the Holy Spirit, may we offer Christ's presence and love to mothers in their time of need through our faithful service and support.

FORMING CONSCIENCES FAITHFUL CITIZENSHIP

Subsidiarity

for Faithful Citizenship, the Catholic bishops of the United States identify the four main principles of the Church's social teaching and apply them to some concrete issues. This is not to tell the faithful for whom or against whom to vote, but instead to help them form their consciences in accordance with God's truth as they approach this often-challenging decision. The four main principles are the Dignity of the Human Person, the Common Good, Solidarity, and Subsidiarity. They are all interrelated. This bulletin focuses on Subsidiarity, and the other three principles are covered in three other bulletins in this series.

The principle of Subsidiarity reminds us that larger institutions in society (such as the state or federal government) should not overwhelm or interfere with smaller or local institutions (such as the family, local schools, or the Church community). Yet larger institutions have essential responsibilities when local institutions cannot adequately protect human dignity, meet human needs, or advance the common good. Subsidiarity reflects the essential freedom and innate human dignity of each person while also recognizing the role higher authorities, such as government, can play to ensure that all people are able to thrive.

Respecting this principle promotes the flourishing of each individual person and the realization of the common good. As Pope Francis has explained, the principle of Subsidiarity "allows everyone to assume his or her own role in the healing and destiny of society." By participating in public life locally, each person and the voluntary associations of civil society to which they belong can be "leaven," bringing "enrichment" to neighbors, to communities, and to society as a whole.

As we assist the faithful to take up the call to be "leaven" in society, we seek policies that allow individuals and communities to flourish.

 As the bishops teach in Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, "Family—based on marriage between a man and a woman is the first and most fundamental unit of society: a sanctuary for the creation and nurturing of children. It should be defended and strengthened, not redefined, undermined, or further distorted."⁴

- It is important to uphold parents' rights and responsibilities to care for their children, including the right to direct their children's education in accordance with their convictions, with support rather than interference from the state.⁵ These include the rights of parents to send their child to the school of their choice, and to protect their child from "gender ideology" at school.
- Moreover, laws, programs, and initiatives should strengthen the social safety net and improve family stability. For example, parents should receive support through work, training, assistance with childcare, healthcare, housing and transportation.⁶ The Earned Income Tax Credit and child tax credits continue to be important vehicles to help low-income families out of poverty.
- The Church's special concern for the poor requires the pursuit of social and economic policies which foster jobs with decent working conditions and just wages, and which support the rights of workers, including the ability to organize and bargain collectively without reprisal.⁷

As we pursue the principle of Subsidiarity in our public policies, we pray for all families and for those in poverty, and we support their efforts to exercise their rights and responsibilities in society.






